

"Bleating Hearts" Fundraiser Aug 7 at Goat Patch Brewing

Plan to attend the "Bleeeating Hearts" fundraiser for BCGA at Goat Patch Brewing, located in the renovated Lincoln School at 2727 North Cascade Avenue on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>August</u> <u>7th from 5—9 p.m.</u>

Gardeners are invited to come to this pub to learn more about Goat Patch and try some of their excellent beer. Bear Creek Garden Association will receive \$1 for each pint of beer sold, so long as participants tell the waitress that they are there to support the fundraiser.

Proceeds of the event will go to BCGA's Goat Fund to bring our herd of weed-eating goats back this fall for their 20th anniversary grazing in Bear Creek Park.

Goat Patch does not serve food, but the Mira Sol Food Truck will be parked outside to provide supper items, and Smorbrod, serving open



faced Scandanavian sandwiches, has now opened up its restaurant next door to the pub.

Goat Patch has just celebrated its first anniversary. The owners express their strong commitment to the nonprofit community by hosting a "Bleating Hearts" fundraiser for a local nonprofit group every Tuesday night at the pub. BCGA signed up in mid-March to get this slot in August. Gardeners will gather at the beautiful Gold Hill Mesa Community Room, 142 Raven Mine Drive, for our summer potluck supper on Wednesday, August 22, starting at 5:30 p.m.

BCGA will provide plates, cups, tableware, napkins and lemonade. Gardeners, please bring a main dish <u>plus</u> a salad or dessert. Tables and chairs will be set up indoors so the August late afternoon thundershowers will not affect the potluck.

Families and children may wish to bring a blanket or camp chairs for the lawn.

Plot owners, their helpers and families are all welcome. There is no RSVP for this event, just come. There is plenty of parking at the building and on surrounding streets.

King Soopers gift cards will be available at the potluck. Gardeners can help raise funds to bring back the goats by using and refilling a card.

Rains Bring Abundance- Please Donate Excess to the Zoo and Food Rescue

Monsoon rains have boosted energy in the garden, and many plots are awash in greens, cabbages, zucchini and other produce. Please don't let it go to waste—take the time to harvest what you can't use or give to friends and donate it to the Zoo and to Food Rescue.

It takes time, and a little planning, to have produce rinsed off, freshly bagged and ready to go for the weekly pickups. The animals and the folks who receive veggies from Food Rescue, really appreciate your generosity.

The Zoo will gladly take overgrown vegetables and also broccoli stems and leaves, lettuce that has bolted (we have plenty of that at the moment) and corn stalks. No dirt or roots, please.

Select produce for Food Rescue that is not overripe or damaged. If you pick the evening before pickup, please bag the produce to keep it from wilting overnight. Tarps and baskets are placed on the ground inside the Truck Gate the evening before a pickup. Weekly pickups are:

Zoo: Thursday 9:30 a.m.

Food Rescue: Saturday 10:00 a.m.

Gardeners have been sending vegetables from their plots to both groups since the first of July. The volume always increases substantially in August and September when tomatoes and corn are ready and the zucchini just keeps on coming.

Bee House Experiment



Gardeners Jennifer Dastur and James Burke each mounted a bee house on their plots this spring. Jennifer is an experienced beekeeper who is active in the local beekeepers' association. The houses are not to be confused with bee hives, which are inhabited by honey bees. A bee house is small enough that it could be mistaken for a bird house.

The resident bees are mason or carpenter bees, good pollinators that are relatively docile and do not produce honey. The board approved these two houses in 2018 and may approve more in the future if Jennifer and James feel that they have proven effective in the community garden.

HAS Orphans Find a Home

Plants left over from the Horticultural Art Society (HAS) Spring Plant Sale were donated to BCGA and given away to gardeners in June. BCGA thanks HAS for its ongoing generosity.

<u>Plot Stats.</u>There are 104 full size plots in the garden. This year, 108 individuals rented a total of 82 full plots and 44 half plots. We have lost four gardeners. On July 31, there are two vacant half plots and one vacant full plot. Not bad, for a year in which Mother Nature has provided heat, drought and heavy rain challenges!
