Live and Let Live



Gardeners always find that they are giving something back to Nature. It's just the way Nature works. A bird pecks a strawberry, a corn borer takes kernels at the top of the cob, a mouse nibbles on a pumpkin. It's OK. We still get an abundance of vegetables from our gardens.

Today a tomato hornworm was munching on the leaves on my tomato plant. (This photo shows one on dill, which it favors even over tomatoes.)

A little pruning isn't going to hurt the tomato plant. I don't want to eat the leaves, and the hornworm is not interested in eating my tomatoes. A hornworm is a fierce-looking creature, and it can reach a fat three+ inches long, so gardeners often react instinctively and kill it.

But wait, remember that a caterpillar is in the first stage of its life. Left alone, it will drop to the ground, form a chrysalis and be transformed into a beautiful black swallowtail butterfly!



There's another benefit to accepting some damage to our plants and leaving caterpillars undisturbed. Birds depend on soft squishy caterpillars to feed their babies while they are in the nest, and they need lots and lots of healthy (not poisoned) caterpillars. Let nature work in this beautiful garden.

Notes for All Gardeners



Missing Berms. The occasional down-pours in July-August thunderstorms will cause water to flow rapidly through the garden from west to east. Gardeners at the east end are most vulnerable to flood damage on their plots. For this reason, please build and maintain these berms:

- (1) Around your plot. They keep flood water from washing into the plot and also keep water from flowing into the aisles when a gardener is watering.
- (2) Across the east-west aisles at every intersection. In the eastern half of the garden an extra berm mid-way between main aisles will also slow the east-west rush of water in a thunder-storm.

Even our experienced gardeners have not done a very good job on the berms across aisles this year. (Maybe we just couldn't believe it would ever rain hard again!) Please make an effort to get these berms in place (bring soil from inside the plots) before fast downpours in July-August thunderstorms cause damage to our gardens.

Folks in the west half of the garden must protect those in the east half by being diligent about this.

Be aware that once a berm is in place, foot traffic will wear it down so it must be rebuilt once in a while during the rest of the season.

Rampant Pumpkins and Squashes. These vining plants should be trained to stay within your plot. Please don't let them run into the aisles or into the two-foot paths where plots adjoin each other. Be kind to your neighbor by maintaining those two-foot paths all season.

The Straw Deadline is July 31. Thank you to everyone who is using straw mulch this year to reduce water consumption and provide good organic matter for their soil. Please spread out the straw by July 31 so that it has time to start softening and decomposing before it is tilled into the plots in the fall. Bales of straw not spread out by July 31 will be removed from the garden.

<u>Dumpsters</u>. Two large dumpsters will be placed by the gates in the north parking lot on Labor Day weekend and they will remain in place until Closing Day. They are emptied two to three times a week, as they fill up with garden refuse.
