# Ordering Garden Mix — Rototilling Your Plot

Garden Mix is a blend of compost and manure created by Don's Garden Shop. BCGA gardeners have used it on their plots for many years. If you want Garden Mix for your plot, the price is \$45.00 per cubic yard (\$22.50 for a half yard) and it must be paid for in advance, before the order is placed with Don's Garden Shop. The recommended amount is one cubic yard for a full plot, but some gardeners like to use more. A cubic yard will be 1/2" thick when spread over a full plot. The price is a slight increase over last year's price.

To order Garden Mix: Mail your check, payable to Bear Creek Garden Association, to Post Office Box 38326, Colorado Springs, CO 80937. Your check must arrive in the box no later than Monday, October 1. Checks that arrive after the deadline will miss the order and will be returned.

The Garden Mix will arrive on October 5th or 6th, and will be dumped inside the truck gate on the BCGA plot. The Parks Department will bring a skid loader into the garden on Octo-

ber 10 to move Garden Mix onto the plots of those who ordered it. There is no additional charge for this service, but gardeners must clear a space on their plots plot where the worker can dump a load.

Depending on the number of yards ordered, a second truckload may arrive after the first pile has been moved onto plots.

Of course, gardeners can opt to move their Garden Mix using a wheelbarrow if they wish, preferably before the backhoe arrives. A special white 5 gallon measuring bucket and directions for measuring the Mix will be provided by the pile. Forty level-full buckets are equal to one cubic yard. Please measure responsibly if you are moving the Mix yourself. Do not use any other bucket for measuring!

Remember that plots must be down to <u>bare dirt by October</u>

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# Cleanup is Underway

The two Bestway dumpsters arrived on the Labor Day weekend. They will be in place until the garden closes, and are emptied on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday.

Gardeners are encouraged to start clearing out plots now. Heavy roots like broccoli and cabbage, vining plants like squash and tomatoes and anything that is diseased should go into the dumpsters. Don't wait until the last weekends when dumpsters fill up fast.

If the dumpsters are full, keep the refuse on your plot until they have been emptied, and come back later to carry your refuse to the dumpsters. PLEASE DO NOT EVER pile any refuse around the gates or dumpsters.

# Garden Mix—Tilling

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two weekends (October 13-14 and 20-21) so that gardeners can till in straw, light weeds and vegetable remains as well as the Garden Mix.

There is no charge for using the tillers, but a \$10 donation to the Goat Fund will be requested for each plot you till yourself. If you are unable to run a tiller, a volunteer may be able to do it for you. There is a charge for this service: \$10 for a half plot and \$20 for a full plot. Please include a request for tilling help in your e-mail and include the donation or fee for help in your payment when you send in your check for Garden Mix.

### **Tiller Liability Release Required**

Every person who operates a rototiller or other motorized equipment at the garden <u>must have a Motorized Equipment Liability Release on file with BCGA.</u> A list of Motorized Equipment Releases currently on file, together with the Release form, is being sent to gardeners with this newsletter.

If you plan to run a tiller and your name is not on the list, please print the form, sign it before a notary and have it notarized, then mail it to the garden post office box right away.

## Garden Notes

Water Usage. Relentless heat in June pushed water usage up to record levels at the garden. By August 31, usage exceeded the number of gallons used for the whole season in 2017. It appears that we will exceed our \$4,500 line item in the budget for water in 2018. However, this is OK. We have funds to pay the water bill. Please continue to use all the water you need to keep vegetables producing as we harvest. Always water in the coolest parts of the day—morning and evening, and never with a hose from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.

Goat Patch Brewing Co. The Friends of the Goats fundraiser at Goat Patch Brewing on North Cascade Avenue was a good success. The patrons of this vibrant pub learned about the garden and the goats and and nearly \$300 was raised for the goat fund. Thank you to everyone who participated. Missed it? Make Requests Now for 2019 For More or Different Space

Gardeners in good standing can keep the same plot from year to year, reaping the benefits of the work they do to improve the soil. If you want to keep your same plot, there is no need to do anything now.

However, some gardeners may want to pick up an adjacent half plot if it becomes available, or move from a half plot to a full plot or from an interior plot to a fence plot.

## Saving Seed for Next Year

Some gardeners save seed from their favorite plants at this time of year. Seed from open pollinated or heirloom plants is reasonably likely to produce similar plants next year. Seed from hybrid plants probably will not, because it will emulate one or the other parent. Squashes joyfully intermingle in the garden and saved seed can produce real surprises.

BCGA raises the money every year to bring in the goats. They clear out noxious weeds and brush in an 18-acre area around our two-acre community garden under a Weed Management Agreement between BCGA and the County Parks Department. Parks managers have agreed to use no chemicals to control weeds in these 18 acres.

The work done annually by the goats protects the garden from chemical sprays. Because goats favor plants with broad leaves, including brush, the grazing (and the poop and pee goats distribute over the ground) enhances the grasses wild grasses and helps with wildfire mitigation.
